## High Risk Area: Suicide

1. Colorado Crisis Services

In addition to providing a 24 hr. hotline; Colorado Crisis Services is Colorado's first statewide resource for mental health, substance use or emotional crisis help, information and referrals. We formed, in partnership with the Colorado Department of Human Services, to strengthen Colorado's mental health system. Our purpose is to provide greater access to mental health services, ensuring Coloradans get the right services in the right locations at the right time.

# 2. The Steven A Cohen Military and Family Clinic

The Steven A. Cohen Military Family Clinic at University of Colorado Anschutz Medical Campus provides confidential, compassionate and personalized mental health care to active duty service members (with Tricare referral), post-9/11 veterans and family members.

Services are available regardless of discharge status, role while in uniform, or combat experience. Evidenced-based treatments and services are provided by culturally-competent professionals trained to work with veterans and military families. While the clinic is located in Greenwood Village, care is available almost <u>anywhere in Colorado</u>.

#### 4. <u>The Suicide Prevention Coalition of Colorado</u>

Today, SPCC's membership of concerned agencies, organizations and individuals who are working in the areas of suicide prevention, intervention and postvention has statewide reach.

While they are not a crisis center, they have links and access to many resources across the State.
